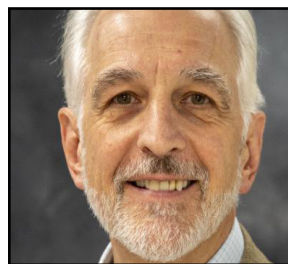

A program update from PSP faculty advisor Dr. Art Spisak



The Presidential Scholars Program (PSP), which was formalized as a program in 2014, is comprised of all the current Presidential Scholars on campus. That number right now is about 145 students. It has elected student officers, other appointed board members, a staff advisor (Camille Socarras, Honors Program Scholarship Coordinator) and a faculty advisor (Dr. Art L. Spisak, Honors Program Director).

The PSP was designed to help Presidential Scholars get to know each other better so that they could serve as resources for one another. Presidentials are also expected to give back to the Honors Program and university in ways that best match their own capabilities and goals. The PSP offers regular events, at least one per semester with the University's president, as well as less formal events to help build community. Presidential Scholars also take seminars together. For this year the seminars are in the spring semester and are all themed around self-discovery. These are one semester-hour classes, with a high degree of class participation and involvement. Presidentials will learn more about themselves, the PSP, Honors Program, and the various opportunities available to them.

In the recent past there were about twenty new entering Presidentials per year. This current academic year the number of entering Presidentials was 91. The number of awardees was increased in order to make the PSP more inclusive.

What are you currently doing?

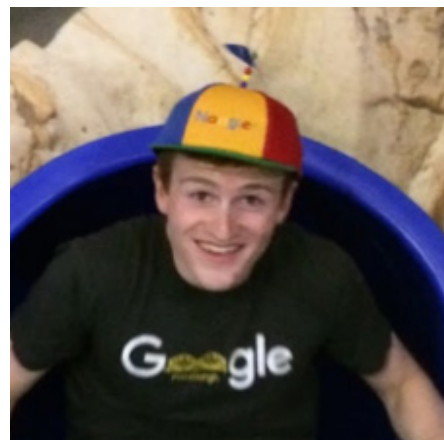

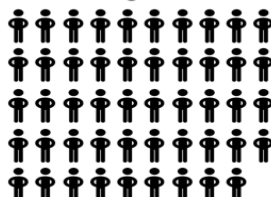
Alumni by the numbers

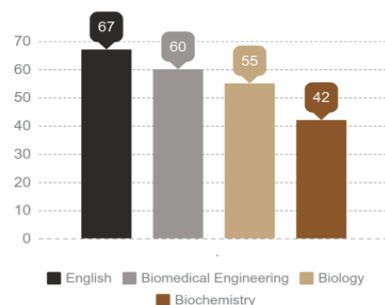
Smallest Graduating Class

The First Recipients of the Presidential Scholarship in 1979

Ten H.S. seniors win Iowa Presidential Scholarships

Ten of Iowa's top high school seniors have received \$4,000 University of Iowa Presidential Scholarships, according to U of I president Willard L. Boyd.

The award, which is applied toward tuition and costs at the U of I over a four-year period, will be given annually to 10 college-bound seniors and is based on academic achievement or artistic talent. This is the first year for the award.

The 10 seniors who received the scholarship were selected from among top high school seniors from across the state who were nominated to participate in the U of I Scholars Recognition Program.

The scholarship recipients are Stacy M. Crossland and Timothy J. Freese, Sioux City; Margaret O. Little and Richard D. Meisner, Des Moines; Megan McCormally, Burlington; Charles A. Miller, Davenport; Jennifer S. Overton, Atlantic; Margaret E. Poepsel, Iowa City; Kathryn J. Ulm, Fort Madison, and Scott C. Allendorf, Clinton.

The awards were presented to the students by U of I alumni in their respective communities: In Sioux City by Mrs. Bonnie Killinger, BA '62 and Dr. George G. Spellman, MD '43; in Des Moines by Mr. Kenneth P. MacDonald, BA '26 and Mr. Nolden I. Gentry, Jr., BA '60, JD '64; in Burlington by Mr. Albert H. Hass, BA '57; in Davenport by Dr. Erling Larson, MA '48; in Atlantic by Mrs. Patricia M. Bullock, BA '51; in Iowa City by Mrs. Susan K. Boyd (wife of Willard L. Boyd, president of the U of I); in Fort Madison by Mr. A. Anthes Smith, BSC '42, and in Clinton by Mr. Robert G. Koons, BA '49, MA '50.

The Scholars Recognition Program is a means of recognizing outstanding high school students for their achievements. To qualify, students must be in the top 2 percent of their high school class.

The campus program includes opportunities to visit departments in which they are interested and to participate in musical auditions and artistic critiques.

Funds for the Presidential Scholars Program come through gifts and bequests received through the University of Iowa Foundation. ■
